MEALS ON WHEELS PLACEMATS

Meals on Wheels is an organization which provides a hot and nutritious meal once a day from Monday to Friday to the area shut in's and seniors in their own homes. Each year the guild donated placemats to this organization who then distributes them at Christmas. The St. Catharines and Thorold chapter distributes around 350 meals.

The following are some suggestions for making the placemats:

- 1. The finished size should measure about 12" X 18"
- 2. Get together with a couple of friends for coffee, chit chat and sew.
- 3. Made a crazy quilt design with batting and backing
- 4. Make a reversible with Christmas on one side and another season on the other.
- 5. Applique a cut out from a large print on background fabric and add borders.
- 6. Use an orphan block or make a log cabin block and add borders.
- 7. They don't have to be Christmas themed.

Completed placemats can be handed in at any meeting from September to November

NHQG Scholarship Value \$1,000.00

To promote an interest in Fine Arts, Art History, Visual Arts, or Design, with an interest in Textile/Fibre Arts as a Career/Life skill

Qualification Requirements:

- **1.** The student must be graduating or have graduated last year from a secondary school program in the Niagara Region.
- **2.** The student may win only once.
- **3.** The student must be a Canadian citizen.
- 4. The student must show personal growth and leadership in school and community activities.
- **5.** The student must include a typed 350 500 word essay on the topic of "Textile/Fibre Arts as a Life Skill and/or Career" with their application.
- 6. The application must be signed by the student and student's Principal or Vice Principal.
- **7.** The student must provide names and contact information of 2 references. These references should not be immediate family members.
- 8. The student must be registered in a Canadian Post-Secondary institution.
- **9.** The student must indicate which Canadian Post-Secondary institution and program of study they will be attending.

Conditions:

- 1. To receive the Scholarship award, the student must obtain **75 merit points or more** as outlined on the application form.
- 2. If the scholarship recipient does not attend an accredited college or university in the Fall or Spring for any reason, he/she shall forfeit the scholarship to allow another student who has achieved 75 merit points or more, to take advantage of the scholarship. In the event that the successful applicant must forfeit and no other applicant has achieved the requisite 75 merit points, there shall be no scholarship for that year.

- 1. Applications must be postmarked by May 31st of each year.



The love of sewing is our common thread.

Row by Row

Row #6 - Log Cabin

The log cabin quilt pattern is one of the most beloved and recognized quilt designs. While it's natural to assume that this block originated in the United States during the pioneer days, the origins of the block seem to go back much further. Similar designs have been found on ancient Egyptian mummies and in an English quilt pre-dating 1830. Log cabin quilts appeared during the time of the Civil War. The block

name may have had a connection to the presidency of Abraham Lincoln. In traditional log cabin blocks, one half is made of dark fabrics and the




other half light. A red centre symbolized the hearth of home and a yellow centre represented a welcoming light in the window. Anecdotal evidence suggests that during the Civil War, a log cabin quilt with a black centre hanging on a clothesline was meant to signal a stop for the Underground Railroad.

The White House Steps, Court House Steps, eight-sided Pineapple, Barn Raising, and Sunshine and Shadows are just some of the hundreds of names and pattern variations.

Log cabin quilts are natural candidates for strip-piecing and can be made in a fraction of the time it took our ancestors. Log cabins are still a favourite choice for scrap quilts and there is even a resurgence of crazy quilts made using log cabin blocks.

It's virtually impossible to run out of ways to make beautiful log cabin quilts. The log cabin is a pattern likely to stay in "style".¹

Instructions for One 12" Block

This will be a finished 12" block. You will make four blocks for the 48" finished row.

Material Requirements and Cutting

You will need two 2½" squares to start and varying lengths 2½" wide.

- Start with the centre piece #1, which is 2½" square.
- Add your second 2½ " square to the top. <u>Always press away from the centre</u>

square.

 Continue adding rectangles in a clockwise fashion; #3 is 2½" by 4½".





- 4. #4 is 2½" by 4½".
- 5. #5 is 2½" by 6½".
- 6. #6 is 2½" by 6½".
- 7. #7 is 2½" by 8½".
- 8. #8 is 2½" by 8½".
- 9. #9 is 2½" by 10½".
- 10. #10 is 2½" by 10½".
- 11. #11 is 2½" by 12½".

Tips

- Roughly lay out your design in advance and decide how many colours you are going to use (Leslie selected red centre square, and then used one dark colour and one light colour in her batik theme).
- You may precut your squares and rectangles to the required size. Because Leslie had only two colours, she used a "trim as you go" method by using long strips that were 2½" wide. She trimmed to the required length after adding each new strip.



* Note - now is the time to make some creative decisions. You may complete the block with a centre square, one dark and one light colour, which could also be your background material. Or you may wish to use

multiple coloured strips. Leslie isn't sure what her next square is going to look like - the same or something entirely different.

Row #7 - Dresden Plate

"The Dresden Plate quilt pattern was one of the most popular quilts made during the 1920s and 30s. It was first published in the 20s but not always under the name Dresden Plate. Grandmother's Sunburst, Friendship Ring, Aster, Dahlia and Sunflower are all names...seen for this pattern. The 1930s version is usually easy to date because of the typical floral prints of the period. Some were made with prettily patterned feedsacks while a few were done with solid prints. This quilt is made of blocks with fabric appliquéd in a series of radiating

"petals" with flat sides. Usually they radiate from a central circle which is more representative of a flower than a plate thus the flower names seen for this pattern."

Instructions for One 12" Block

This will be a finished 12" block. You will make four blocks for the 48" finished row. The Dresden Plate can be made in many different sizes and styles. We chose a block will have 14 petals/tumblers and we selected a 4" petal/tumbler.

Material Requirements and Cutting

Background fabric - 121/2" x 121/2"

Three (or the number of different petal colours you want) pieces - 4" wide (4" x 11" will make 5 tumblers)

Instructions

- Cut out the paper tumbler template, which includes the ¼" seam allowance. It should measure 4" high.
- Create a plastic template and use a piece of self-adhesive grip on the back to make cutting easier. (Image 1)
- 3. From one of the petal colours, cut a piece 4" x 11".
- 4. Cut tumblers by reversing the template after each cut. (Image 2)

- 5. Lightly press tumblers right sides together.
- 6. Stitch a ¼" seam along the top/long edge; do a short back-stitch at the fold (point to be)
- 7. Clip corner. (Image 3)



- 8. Finger press the seam **open** with your thumbs as you turn the tumbler. Gently, sharpen the point with a poker.
- 9. Press aligning seam with original press line. (Image 4)
- 10. Arrange tumblers in a pleasing pattern. There should be a set sequence in the progression of fabrics. Sew together along rough edges.
- 11. Press seams in one direction. (Image 5)
- 12. Find the centre of the background square and place plate. I used a light basting spray before pinning it securely. You can baste with a large stitch through the middle of each tumbler/petal to hold the plate securely. (Image 6 looks lumpy because of the pins but is laying flat.)


- 13. Hand or machine-appliqué with a hidden stitch or feature stitch with a complementary or contrasting thread.
- 14. Machine-stitch around the rough centre edges to secure seams before adding the centre circle.
- 15. Cut the template (3" in diameter) for the centre out of stiff cardboard like a file folder. Cut on the line as smoothly as possible.
- Dab a little glue on the wrong side of the centre fabric to hold template in place - not too much because the template comes out. (Image 7)
- 17. Cut a generous ¼" around the template.
- Baste a stitch around the seam allowance, leaving long threads. (Image 8)
- 19. At the ironing board, pull threads and press down seam allowance. Gently remove the template and reuse it.
- 20. Hand or machine-appliqué to plate.

21. Arrange Dresden Plate squares in a row. Note orientation. The centre line of the row is in an "indent" of the plate. (Image 9)



Tips

- 1. Sewing the tumbler ends is a great opportunity for chain stitching. (Image 10)
- Use a piece of felt as a mini-design board when laying out the tumblers. It also helps keep you organized when sewing the tumblers together.

Note - there are opportunities for creative decisions.

- How many different tumblers will be in each Dresden Plate square?
- Will each square be the same or different?
- How will the selection of material for centre circles impact the plate?
- How will the choice of appliqué style and thread colour impact the plate?
