# **Community Outreach Report**

Our biggest challenge for this year was working to meet the deadline for the YWCA donation to their transitional housing unit. We met, and actually exceeded our goal, with many beautiful quilts completed. Officially we are donating 48 quilts (10 double, 30 twin, 1 lap size, and 7 baby). Thanks to photographer Tara McInerney and helpers Kathleen O'Flaherty, and Karen Jantz for making the photo shoot at Montebello Park so much fun!



Many, many thanks to all who participated in sewing for this project and special thank you to the members of the Niagara Modern Quilt Guild who assisted us. (\*)

As of this writing, a total of 161 quilts have been completed this year. More tops have been donated, and a number are still in process of being quilted or bound. Everyone certainly has been prolific this year! Thank you to everyone who has contributed to piecing, quilting, binding or donating fabric or batting. All of this would not be possible without you.

Kathleen O'Flaherty has been coordinating the baby quilts for FACS. Thanks to her efforts, a total of 98 baby quilts were donated in 2020, and a total of 30 so far in 2021. Baby quilts are dropped off every week on her porch. This initiative for FACS grew from a desire that each sweet baby taken into care should be wrapped in love just as our own babies were. Approximately 100 babies per year in Niagara are taken into care. Thank you to many sewers who often give from the heart using their own materials.



This past year (June 2020 to current) a total of 54 quilts were donated to Hospice, the YWCA Shelter for Women, Hope Recovered (Niagara Mental Health), Pathstone, a family sponsored at Christmas time, and several individuals. This is considerably less than we have donated for the last several years, but many of the places we have previously donated to are not currently taking quilts due to COVID-19.

Funding continues to be an issue for Community Quilts. Although in past years, we have received money in the annual budget of the guild, all spending from guild monies was halted. Therefore, the only way we were able to meet our commitment to the YWCA initiative was through many individuals donating fabric for backing and bindings, pieced tops, and rolls of batting. In addition, Kathleen O'Flaherty has been tireless in fund raising through selling of donated items on FaceBook Marketplace. The money she raised has gone to purchase needed batting.

This year has certainly been different, and we have all had to learn to adapt and change with the times. Since this is a time of change, this is a good time to ask what the members would like to see from Community Outreach. Please take the time if you haven't already, to email Jennifer Dyck (jenniferk2p2@gmail.com) to let me know what you think Community Outreach should focus on for the next year.

### PROGRAMS AND WORKSHOPS REPORT

As the Ontario Emergency Orders for the Covid 19 Pandemic played havoc with our lives, so the Program and Workshop Committee adapted to this new reality. During the summer of 2020,all speakers for 2020/2021 were contacted and made aware of the potential cancellation of programming and were asked for their consideration in cancelling their contract if indeed we could not meet as a guild. In August 2020, the fall speakers and workshop presenter's contracts were cancelled and samples were returned. Again in December, the remaining speakers and workshop presenters for 2021 were approached for cancellation and workshop samples were returned. All speakers were open to being approached again in the future once we are able to meet again. A tentative plan is in the works for trunk shows and workshops once it is possible to open up under government orders. The committee looks forward to serving the needs of the members through engaging speakers and workshops.




